SYNOPSIS

The fluidity and complexity of modern maritime security challenges demand an in-depth understanding of the law of the sea, maritime law, and national policies and regulations before formulating responses. Newly emerging challenges and transformed threats, including maritime terrorism, drug trafficking, migrant smuggling, and the use of unmanned vessels, remain largely unregulated under the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) 1982.

This has necessitated the adoption of various international conventions and protocols. The course also addresses the protection of offshore installations and the coasts of maritime States, highlighting the contribution of international organizations, particularly the International Maritime Organization (IMO), and the importance of regional cooperation.

Additionally, it examines the special status of warships and explores the

jurisprudential contributions of international courts and tribunals to this branch of law.

The course offers participants—senior government officials and shipping executives—the opportunity to interact with professionals in an academic atmosphere, reinforcing their knowledge, skills, and proficiency in international maritime security law.

By the end of the course, participants are expected to be equipped with both theoretical and operational strategic-legal knowledge, enabling them to respond to and advise the industry, maritime forces, and government departments on maritime security-related issues. The IMLI Course on International Maritime Security Law has been specifically designed to address critical maritime security threats to the international rule of law at sea and the freedom of navigation. It provides an in-depth analysis of these threats, existing international laws, and State practices aimed at deterring them.
